

From the President

It has been a busy and productive fall at The College.

In October, the Board of Regents met in Chicago. We were pleased to welcome two new Board Members to our ranks. Steven I. Altchuler, M.D., Ph.D., is on staff at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, where he has held a number of leadership positions, including Medical Director of the Mayo Psychiatry and Psychology Treatment Center, and currently oversees accreditation activities (Joint Commission and CMS) for all of Mayo Clinic's facilities in five states. Darrell G. Kirch, M.D., is President and CEO of the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC), which represents the nation's medical schools, teaching hospitals, and academic medical societies.

The Board of Regents also approved 35 new Members and five new Fellows who will be inducted in Hawaii. Twelve new Laughlin Fellows, two new PRITE Fellows, and two new CHILD PRITE Fellows will also attend the Annual Meeting. In order to achieve greater institutional and geographic diversity in its pool of applicants, the Laughlin Fellowship Selection Committee recently adopted a policy that states that each sponsoring institution can nominate only one candidate. As a result, the current crop of Laughlin Fellows represents more diverse academic medical institutions from across the U.S. and Canada. For more information about this talented group of

The Board has set as a major goal the expansion of our pipeline of younger members. A new task force has been charged with developing new, innovative ways in which we can make our Annual Meeting even more relevant for early- and mid-career psychiatrists. Potential approaches include holding a pre-meeting that focuses on career and leadership development, providing more opportunities for younger attendees to interact with more seasoned College Members, and encouraging Members to invite junior colleagues to the Annual Meeting as guests. Please share with us your thoughts about these and other potential strategies. Of special note: there will be an interest group on Thursday in Hawaii focused on this goal. I encourage you—especially those who are relatively new to The College—to participate in that session.

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Fall is also PRITE and CHILD PRITE season at The College. Nearly 300 programs purchased PRITE in 2018, with 7,200 resident examinees. In addition, 139 child programs administered CHILD PRITE to nearly 1,000 examinees. PIPE sales were brisk this fall, as well, with the to-date total topping 900.

As the end of the year approaches, we are putting the finishing touches on the Hawaii meeting. Without question, Manny Tancer and the members of the Committee on Scientific Programs have designed an outstanding program. The 2019 program reflects the theme, "The Future of Psychiatry: Embracing the Challenges," with the session topics focusing on current challenges and future opportunities for our field, including emerging health care delivery models, psychiatrist and physician wellness, and our nation's epidemic of violence. The breakout sessions will complement the plenaries by taking a deeper dive into these topics, and will also include group discussions focusing on the opioid epidemic, launching a successful career in psychiatry, cross-cultural issues, and child psychiatry. The courses will cover CAM and emerging access to marijuana, cutting edge technology, treatment resistant mood and anxiety disorders, and strategies for building a successful career in academic psychiatry. From the Executive Director

While planning our last meeting in Hawaii in 2013, my predecessor, Maureen Shick, asked our hotel contact about Hawaii's time zone. "We're not in a time zone," was the reply. While that's not literally true—Hawaii is, in fact, on Hawaii Standard Time all year—I think it works metaphorically. All notions of time seem to melt away when you step off the airplane onto Hawaiian soil.

That was certainly the case when College President Bob Golden, our meeting planner Cherylyn Marks, and I visited Hawaii in November for a final walkthrough of the Hilton Hawaiian Village. Set on beautiful Waikiki Beach, the hotel seems somehow outside of time — like Shangri La or a tropical Brigadoon.

The hotel's history stretches back to 1961 when Conrad Hilton bought the property. That same year, Elvis Presley filmed *Blue Hawaii* at the resort. Over the years the property has grown, from the addition of the iconic Rainbow Tower in 1968 to the Kalia Tower in 2001.

A virtual compound, the Hilton Hawaiian Village is self-contained. Indeed, one need never leave the property. If you prefer your water unsalted, you may also relax at one of the hotel's six swimming pools. Dining options also abound. With over 18 restaurants, ranging in fare from casual to fine dining, there's something for everyone. Avid shoppers will be pleased as well, with a whole array of retail outlets. Pick up toiletries or chocolate covered macadamia nuts at ABC Store, or splurge on a purchase from the Louis Vuitton boutique.

And there is a lot to see and do throughout the island. I had the pleasure of exploring Oahu with College Members and Honolulu residents, Ike and Lisa Ahmed. We drove along the eastern coast of Oahu. Program Honors Top Psychiatry Residents, Future Leaders

The American College of Psychiatrists has announced the 2019 recipients of its prestigious Laughlin Fellowship.

Named after College founder, Henry P. Laughlin, M.D., the Fellowship program was launched in 1976 to recognize outstanding accomplishments by psychiatry residents in the United States and Canada. Each year, The College selects 13 residents deemed most likely to make a significant future contribution to the field of psychiatry. The College provides a stipend for the Laughlin Fellows to attend The College's Annual Meeting and participate in all educational functions, allowing them to interact with College Members, as well as their peers in other residency programs.

Laura B. Dunn, M.D., Chair of the Laughlin Fellowship Selection Committee said, "This is truly an amazing group of Fellows, and the Committee is thrilled to welcome them. They embody the future of psychiatric service, leadership, and innovation, and each Fellow brings unique experiences and talents to the College and the field."


Taken by nearly all psychiatry residents in the United States, PRITE serves as an educational resource for psychiatry residents and training programs. The exam allows individual residents to compare their knowledge base and clinical skills to their peers and offers residency training directors an insight into the performance of their residents, enabling them to make their programs more effective.

In order to include the views of psychiatry residents who sit for the exam, The College selects residents from programs throughout the United States and Canada to serve on the PRITE Editorial Board. In addition to being invited to the

Annual Meeting of The College, the PRITE Fellows are required to attend two PRITE Editorial Board meetings during their Fellowship. PRITE Fellows participate in the question writing process by developing an assigned number of questions and then editing and referencing exam items.

The American College of Psychiatrists Announces 2019 Award Recipients

Awards Honor Leaders in Mental Healthcare

The American College of Psychiatrists has announced the recipients of its 2019 awards, which will be presented at The College's Annual Meeting in Hawaii on February 23, 2019. The awards recognize those mental health professionals responsible for advancing psychiatry through their service, research, clinical work, and educational activities.



Carol A. Bernstein, M.D., Receives the Distinguished Service Award

The Distinguished Service Award recognizes significant achievements and leadership in the field of psychiatry. Dr. Carol Bernstein is Professor of Psychiatry and Neurology at NYU Langone Medical Center.

Dr. Bernstein has held multiple leadership positions in organized psychiatry. She has been on the Executive Committee of the American Association of Directors of Psychiatric Residency Training and chair of the Committee on Medical Education of the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry. At the American Psychiatric Association, Dr. Bernstein has held significant leadership positions, including serving as President of the organization in 2010-2011. She has also served as a Director on the Board of the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, as well as the Residency Review Committee for Psychiatry. She is currently Treasurer of The American College of Psychiatrists.

Dr. Bernstein also hosts a weekly call-in show for consumers on Sirius Radio's Doctor Radio Channel.

A recipient of numerous awards and author of many significant publications, articles, chapters and books, Dr. Bernstein has had a major impact on graduate education in all of medicine. The value of her work in support of trainee and physician mental health and wellness has made a lasting impact on both new and veteran practitioners in the field.



Bowis Award Presented to Arden D. Dingle, M.D.

Each year, The College presents the Bowis Award to a Member or Fellow in the organization who has played an important leadership role in The College. Dr. Arden Dingle has been an important and highly respected part

of the volunteer structure at The College for many years, serving as Editor-in-Chief of the PRITE since 2010.

Dr. Dingle is a highly respected educator in psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry. Most recently, she is a faculty member at University of Texas, Rio Grande Valley School of Medicine, where she has been a trailblazer in creating and implementing a resident education program in psychiatry as well as extensive curricula for medical students throughout their four years of training.

In addition to her volunteer work with The College, Dr. Dingle has extensive experience with multiple other organizations, both as a question writer and task force and committee member. These organizations include the American Psychiatric Association, the National Board of Medical Examiners, the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, the American Association of Directors of Psychiatry Residency Training, and the American Association of Child Adolescent Psychiatry. She has received numerous awards in the area of education locally, regionally and nationally.



The Award for Creativity in Psychiatric Education Presented to the Train New Trainers Primary Care Psychiatry Fellowship

The Award for Creativity in Psychiatric Education was created to recognize noteworthy teaching innovations in the field of psychiatry. The College has selected the joint UC Irvine / UC Davis Train New Trainers (TNT) Primary Care Psychiatry (PCP) Fellowship to receive the 2019 award. This program was designed to provide targeted clinical psychiatric training to those with an established background

in medicine. The curriculum is centered on addressing common psychiatric conditions and is delivered by an inter-professional faculty team, many of whom are dually trained *both* in primary care and psychiatry.

The fellowship provides over 50 hours of required training. The program includes: 1) two weekend teaching sessions, 2) one hour per month of individualized, in person or teleconferenced mentoring sessions with a TNT PCP fellowship faculty member/mentor, and 3) live, case-based discussions and patient interviews with a focus on integrated primary care psychiatry on a twice per month basis. A primary care psychiatry curriculum developed by UC Irvine / UC Davis Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, and Psychiatry faculty is provided along with reading material. A critical component of the TNT PCP Fellowship is to facilitate trainees in teaching primary care psychiatry principles to their primary care colleagues.



Savita Malhotra, M.B.B.S., M.D., Ph.D., Named Honorary Fellow in The College

The American College of Psychiatrists awards Honorary Fellowships in The College to distinguished professionals who have made significant scientific and clinical contributions to the

field of psychiatry. Dr. Savita Malhotra is the former Dean at the Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education and Research (PGIMER), Professor of Psychiatry and head of the Departments of Psychiatry, Addiction Treatment Program and Treatment Center, and Adolescent Psychiatry in Chandigarh, India. She is a Fellow of the World Health Organization, the Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic in Pittsburgh, PA, and Guy's Hospital in London.

Dr. Malhotra is a pioneer in establishing the discipline of child psychiatry in India, including establishing a full-time three-year advanced post-psychiatry residency degree in this area. Her research focus includes acute and transient psychotic disorders, long-term course and outcome schizophrenia, consultation and liaison psychiatry, epidemiology of mental disorders in adults and children, neurobiology of childhood onset schizophrenia and pervasive developmental disorders, and temperament and psychopathology in children.

Dr. Malhotra is also very active with organized medicine and professional societies, including having served as President of the Asian Society for Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Allied Professions; President of the Indian Association for Social Psychiatry; Assistant Secretary General of the International Association for Child and Adolescent Mental Health and Allied Professions; and as a member of the jury for the Jean Delay prize at the World Psychiatry Association Conference.



The College Names Neal R. Swerdlow, M.D., Ph.D., Recipient of the Stanley Dean Research Award

The Stanley Dean Research Award honors an individual who has had a major impact on the diagnosis and treatment of schizophrenic disorders.

Dr. Neal Swerdlow is Professor of Psychiatry, Director of the Research Residency Track and Vice Chair of Education and Training in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of California, San Diego, School of Medicine.

Dr. Swerdlow has made a number of breakthrough contributions toward the understanding of the neural bases of major mental disorders, particularly schizophrenia. His theoretical models and laboratory data are cited as the foundation for studies and hypotheses advanced by many other investigators. While much of his work has focused on interactions between cortical and subcortical neural circuitry in schizophrenia, OCD and Tourette's Syndrome, he has also made major advances in several other important areas, ranging from the neural basis for corticotropin releasing factor (CRF)-induced behavioral changes, to the use of highly innovative models for identifying new, efficacious atypical antipsychotic medications. Over the past 10 years, Dr. Swerdlow's work has advanced the use of laboratory-based neurophysiological biomarkers to predict therapeutic neurocognitive and clinical responses in schizophrenia patients.

Dr. Swerdlow's innovative preclinical and clinical models have been the catalyst for schizophrenia research at many levels from genetics to therapeutics, and his untiring dedication to the training of future clinical scientists makes him widely respected as both a teacher and a scholar.




**Robert A. Sweet, M.D., Named
Recipient of Award for the
Research in Geriatric Psychiatry**

The Award for Research in Geriatric Psychiatry honors an individual who has made major contributions to the field of geriatric psychiatry. Dr.

Robert Sweet is currently Professor of Psychiatry and Neurology at the University of Pittsburgh and Co-Associate Director for Research at the Mental Illness Research, Education, and Clinical Center (MIRECC), VA Pittsburgh Healthcare System (VAPHS). In addition to his role as MIRECC Fellowship Director, Dr. Sweet directs a postdoctoral fellowship training program at the University of Pittsburgh Department of Psychiatry, focused on training in the translational neuroscience of mental illness.

Dr. Sweet's research is dedicated to understanding the mechanisms which lead to the generation of psychotic symptoms which are core features of the prototypic psychotic disorder schizophrenia, but also occur in about 50% of individuals with Alzheimer's disease. In his work, he has proposed that there are common genetic risk factors and vulnerable brain circuits that act together to cause positive symptoms across these disorders.

In addition to his accomplishments as a scientific investigator, Dr. Sweet serves as a mentor to many predoctoral and postdoctoral students as well as faculty researchers, and directs the T32 "Training for Transformative Discovery Psychiatry" program, funded by the National Institute of Mental Health.



**Madhukar H. Trivedi, M.D.,
Selected as Recipient of Award for
Research in Mood Disorders**

The Award for Research in Mood Disorders is given to an individual who has advanced the understanding and treatment of depression and bipolar disorder. Dr. Madhukar

Trivedi is the Betty Jo Hay Distinguished Chair in Mental Health at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas, Texas. His research over the last 25 years has focused on developing an empirical basis for improving treatment of depression. He has studied the efficacy of antidepressant treatments and validating biomarkers in order to reach the goal of precision medicine for mood disorders. These studies have led to the creation of the Center for Depression Research and Clinical Care, of which he is the founding Director. He also established the Mood Disorders Network, which involves partnering with community providers and training them to screen for and treat depression during patient interactions.

Dr. Trivedi has also helped to establish the Risk and Resilience Network, which is a partnership with local schools and youth organizations to improve healthy development of youth through building resilience. Through this Network, students, parents, and educators receive mental health education training.

He has served on several local and national committees and journal editorial boards, and regularly lectures nationally and internationally. Dr. Trivedi is currently collaborating with investigators in Shanghai on a longitudinal study of depression. He also provided key leadership on several large-scale NIMH funded studies over the years including STAR*D, CO-MED and EMBARC. He has established successful research programs with several colleagues in many medical departments across the country including nephrology, endocrinology, infectious diseases, neurology, immunology, and oncology.
