

From the President

After a ten-year hiatus, The College returns to the Marriott Harbor Beach Resort in Fort Lauderdale for its 2020 Annual Meeting this February. I'm excited to share some information about the hotel and locale, as well as the outstanding program and speakers lined up. However before I do that, I hope you won't mind if I take a moment to share with you some reflections on two long-time members of The College who recently passed away.

Many of us were dismayed and shocked at the sudden death of Carl Bell on August 2. He was 71. Carl was very devoted to the College. He was a speaker at many meetings, including the first day plenary last year in Hawaii. He served on The College Board and was involved in a number of committees. A world expert on fetal alcohol spectrum disorder in African Americans, he tirelessly advocated for choline treatment as a preventive measure. A community psychiatrist and leader, he worked in Chicago and elsewhere to reduce exposure to violence as prevention. He will be remembered for his "bent nail" services research and advocacy against injustice. I will remember him for his sense of humor, his hats, and seeing him doing Tai Chi in the early morning. This is something I now do every day channeling Carl.

Miles Shore died June 20 at age 90. Miles was a mentor of mine, and Margaret and I enjoyed seeing him and Eleanor at many College meetings throughout the 1980s and 90s. A Past-President of The College, he was one of the most prolific Chairs of committees, including Finance, PRITE Commission, Education Award, Nominations and PRITE Fellowship Selection. For many years he was the



Chair of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and then in 1993 moved to the Kennedy School at Harvard where, as tenured Professor, he taught leadership to a generation of young scholars and activists. He was a scholar himself, gentle and funny, a mentor to me and to so many.

Carl and Miles will both be greatly missed.

Now back to some College business. Fort Lauderdale, situated on the southeastern coast of Florida, is located about halfway between West Palm Beach and Boca Raton to the north, and Miami to the south. It's an inviting city, known for its beaches and boating canals. The Marriott is a beautiful palm-tree lined property located on one of the largest private beaches in South Florida. The hotel boasts stunning views of the Atlantic, and features many amenities such as a first-rate luxury spa offering a full range of massages and cosmetic treatments, lagoon-style pool, and for those more activity-inclined, immediate access to parasailing, ocean kayaking, speed boating, sailing, snorkeling, swimming, tennis, golf, and more.

is its proximity to dining, shopping, and cultural venues. (For a complete list of area attractions, visit www.sunny.org). The Fort Lauderdale area features over 4,000 restaurants, offering everything from fine dining to casual bistros. And having a great meal doesn't even require leaving the premises. The hotel has three restaurants to satisfy every appetite, including the acclaimed 3030 Ocean, one of South Florida's most popular restaurants.

In response to several requests from Members for organized activities during the meeting, the College is offering an afternoon outing on Friday, February 21 to Sawgrass Recreation Park that will include an airboat tour of the Everglades. The cost is \$65 per person, and it will go from 2:00 to 6:00 pm, which should give you plenty of time to change after the Friday breakout sessions.

No matter how lovely the setting, The College's scientific program and social events serve as the centerpiece of every Annual Meeting. And the 2020 Annual Meeting will be no exception, as Scott Aaronson and the Scientific Program Committee have constructed a fantastic program for you. As I mentioned in the summer issue of the newsletter, the theme of the meeting is, "A 20/20 Vision of the Future," and the topics on which this theme will focus include a Wednesday morning forum tackling "The Changing Paradigm of Psychopharmacology: Psychedelics, MDMA and NMDA Antagonists," with plenaries and a panel featuring preeminent experts in this area. There will also be presentations by specialists in the fields of bipolar disorder, psychoimmunology, and trauma. While the lineup of plenary sessions and presenters on the program is strong, they are more than matched by the content of the courses and interest groups. The breakout topics include child and adolescent psychiatry, treatment of grief, trauma and resilience, and end of life care.

The Annual Meeting will also include a new component: two "Breakfast with the Experts" sessions on Thursday and Friday mornings prior to the general sessions that will feature roundtables presided over by experts in a variety of topic areas. This will allow attendees to tap into the expertise of seasoned College Members and exchange information and ideas in a more informal setting.

The Annual Meeting will also feature a number of social events to help you reconnect with old friends and make new acquaintances. On Wednesday evening, The College will host a welcome buffet dinner. We've purposely kept Thursday and Friday evenings free to allow you to explore the many wonderful dining options in the vicinity. And we'll cap off Saturday night with our always lively annual banquet.

You'll find a complete Annual Meeting program further on in this newsletter. Hopefully the content will fit your needs; I look forward to feedback at, and after the meeting.

From the Executive Director

I am pleased to announce that registration for the 2020 Annual Meeting in Fort Lauderdale is now open! Although we have included a printed registration form in this newsletter, I encourage you to register online at www.acpsych.org. Please be sure to register all of your guests—even those not attending the scientific program—so we can provide an accurate count for social events and bring the proper badges.

Steve Sharfstein and I, along with our meeting planner, Cherylyn Marks, have scheduled a final walkthrough of the hotel in November. While there, we'll put the finishing touches on meeting plans and make final decisions about event venues.

In the meantime, here is some useful information about the hotel and locale to help you make the most of your time in Florida:



- Those booking through The College block have the option of paying a \$35 per day resort fee, which includes:
 - Two welcome drinks per stay
 - Two bottles of water per guest room per day
 - One beach umbrella daily
 - Two beach mat rentals daily
 - One hour rental per day of non-motorized water sport equipment (surf/paddle/boogie boards and kayaks)
 - Two fitness classes per day
 - One hour of tennis per stay, including rackets
- The hotel offers complimentary room Internet for members of the Marriott rewards program. To join, visit *Marriott Bonvoy*.
- Registrants will also receive access to the hotel's 24-hour fitness center and 10% off spa menu pricing.
- The Marriott is just 10 minutes from the Fort Lauderdale/ Hollywood Airport (FLL). Taxis run about \$20-25/each way and Ubers are slightly less expensive, about \$10-\$15. Shuttles to

and from the hotel are available for \$20/per person, round trip at *Go Airport Shuttle - Fort Lauderdale*

- If you decide to rent a car, please note the hotel charges a discounted rate of \$30 per day for self parking and \$43 for valet parking (plus tax).
- The Marriott offers several dining options on site.
- There also are many additional restaurants in close proximity to the resort. We'll provide you with a dining guide detailing local dining options in January.
- If you're traveling with children ages 5-12, the hotel offers a daily drop off program called Surf Club. The cost is \$25 for the first two hours and \$10 for each additional hour. Surf Club runs from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, but extended hours can be arranged with advanced notice. Call the hotel at 954-525-4000 for more information.
- The weather in Fort Lauderdale during our meeting should be lovely. The average high temperature in late February is 77 degrees. The average low is 59.
