From the Executive Director

I am pleased to announce that registration for the 2019 Annual Meeting in Honolulu is now open! Although we have included a printed registration form in this newsletter, I encourage you to register online at www.acpsych.org. Please be sure to register all of your guests—even those not attending the scientific program—so we can provide an accurate count for social events and bring the proper badges.

Bob Golden and I, along with our meeting planner, Cherylyn Marks, have scheduled a final walkthrough of the hotel in November. While there, we'll put the finishing touches on meeting plans and make final decisions about event venues.

In the meantime, here is some useful information about the hotel and locale to help you make the most of your time in Honolulu:

- The College has negotiated a discounted room rate at the Hilton Hawaiian Village Waikiki Beach Resort starting at \$269 (plus taxes) for a resort view. To book a room at the hotel visit the [hotel's meeting web site](#) or call 808-949-4321. The room block is limited, so we recommend making reservations as soon as possible.
- Those booking through The College block will also receive a discounted resort fee of \$15 per night (the normal rate is \$40). The fee covers:

 - PlayStation 3 with unlimited movies and games
 - Resort audio tour
 - Dive-in movies on Wednesdays and Saturdays at sundown
 - Outdoor morning exercise classes
 - Complimentary 24-hour access to the hotel fitness center

- The weather in Honolulu during our meeting should be lovely. The average high temperature in late February is 81 degrees. The average low is 65.

A Call for Volunteers

In Search of Question Writers to Join the PRITE and CHILD PRITE Editorial Boards

PRITE and CHILD PRITE are central to The College's mission and an important factor in the financial health of the organization. The exams are largely based on the efforts of volunteer question writers, many of whom are College Members. As Committee terms end, we often have open positions which need to be filled. Therefore, we are currently looking for interested College Members, with question writing experience, to apply to join the PRITE and CHILD PRITE Editorial Boards.

Serving on the PRITE or CHILD PRITE Editorial Board is a quite demanding—but ultimately rewarding—experience. Editorial Board Members devote quite a bit of time to question writing and reviewing. They are required to write and reference 40 new questions, as well as participate in batch reviews each year. The Editors estimate that it takes one to two hours to write one quality question, start to finish. In addition, new Editorial Board Members participate in three conference calls, approximately 30-minutes each, providing detailed instruction on each assignment. Mentors are assigned to new Editorial Board Members to answer any questions that arise during the writing and review process.

Editorial Board Members are also required to attend the annual Editorial Board Meeting, which takes place over four days in July. Each Member is assigned a section of questions to present to the group in a relatively informal setting. While the meeting requires focus and engagement, all of the Editorial Board Members agree that it is also very rewarding, thought-provoking and directly builds upon their skills as question writers. It is also a family-friendly meeting, which many spouses and children attend. Staff makes it a point to plan social events which include dinners and/or outings in order for Editorial Board Members to take a break from work and enjoy the company of fellow Board Members.
