### From the President

Dear Colleagues:

Tropical warmth. Gentle breezes. Majestic mountains. Emerald green valleys. Postcard-perfect sunsets. How can you not fall in love with Kaua'i? Happily, the wait is over: after a twelve-year hiatus, The College returns to the Garden Isle for its 2025 Annual Meeting this February.

Kaua'i is Hawaii's fourth largest and oldest island, and while mesmerizing to behold, the island offers more than just stunning beauty. For the adventureminded, Kaua'i boasts multiple outdoor activities including kayaking on the Wailua River, snorkeling on Po'ipū Beach, hiking the trails of Koke'e State Park, ziplining above Kaua'i's scenic valleys, or exploring the beautiful Nā Pali Coast by boat or helicopter. History buffs can learn more about Kaua'i's storied past by following the Koloa heritage trail to explore the island's plantation lineage, or visiting the Wai'oli Hui'ia Church and Mission House on the island's North Shore to learn about missionary life in Hawaii in the 19th century. The informative Kaua'i Museum offers an array of exhibits, artifacts and historical murals, bringing the island's past to life.

Just as lovely as its island setting is the Grand Hyatt Kaua'i Resort & Spa. Set on 52 acres of lushly landscaped grounds, this five-star hotel is a favorite destination for The College. The hotel offers many ways to enjoy the great outdoors. There is a "river" pool that meanders down three stories from the



lobby level of the hotel to the ocean level. And, for the more adventurous, a water slide connects the upper and lower levels of the pool. Beyond the pools there is a large saltwater lagoon with its own beach. For those who prefer the real thing, the hotel features an expansive ocean-front beach—a great place to relax, surf, and swim.

If a day at the spa is more your speed, the hotel's Anara Spa is sure to please. In addition to a full workout room and three-lane lap pool, the spa offers an extensive selection of tropical facials, rejuvenating body scrubs, detoxifying wraps and tension-relieving massages.

However, lovely the setting, the centerpiece of every Annual Meeting is the scientific program. The Scientific Program Committee, chaired by Cathy Crone, has a great meeting planned for Hawaii, which will offer something of interest for everyone: a panel session that will address the ethics of using AI in psychiatry; a plenary on the clinical application of genetics; talks on Instagram




### From the Executive Director

## ABPN Selects College Member Takesha Cooper, M.D., as a Psychiatry Director



The America Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, Inc., has selected College Member Takesha Cooper, M.D., as a Psychiatry Director for an initial four-year term beginning on January 1, 2025. Dr. Cooper previously served on the ABPN Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Examination Committee.

Dr. Cooper currently serves as Department Chair of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the University of Nevada, Reno School of Medicine and Chief of Behavioral Health at Renown Health, the largest not for profit hospital system in Northern Nevada. Previously, she was a Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Neurosciences, and Training Director for Psychiatry at the University of California, Riverside School of Medicine.

Dr. Cooper earned her Doctor of Medicine Degree from the Keck School of Medicine at the University of Southern California and completed her residency at San Mateo County and fellowship at Stanford University. Prior to medical school, she obtained a Master of Science degree in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology from UC Riverside and her Bachelor's degree in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology from UC Santa Barbara.

Dr. Cooper became a Member of The College in 2021.
