## From the President

Greetings, Members of The College. I have been a part of this wonderful organization since 1992, and to me, there is nothing better than to have the opportunity to address you as its President. I must begin, however, by expressing my heartfelt thanks to my predecessor, Laura Roberts, for leading The College through a very tumultuous past two years as President. She managed beautifully in the face of worldwide uncertainty on multiple fronts and disruption to the business of The College. This was no easy task, and I extend to Laura a deep sense of gratitude from all Members of The College for the tremendous job she did on our behalf.

The August Annual Meeting had its genesis in Fall 2019, and I am happy to say it is nearly showtime. I have always had the distinct feeling when attending an Annual Meeting of The College that the atmosphere is not only one of education but also that of a family reunion. As we approach the August Annual Meeting, that feeling is becoming especially pronounced as it has been a while since many of us have seen one another in person. For me, The College is community, and after being apart from that community for so long, I have become acutely aware of just how much it means to me.

I will forego a lengthy description of the August meeting, as Laura did such a great job of this in the previous two issues of the newsletter. You will find a final program on pages 8-12 of this newsletter. However, a few items bear repeating. This meeting will be hybrid, meaning Members may choose

Those who attend virtually will see all Plenary presentations, including the shorter awards talks, on Saturday; however, only those who attend in person will be able to participate in the Pre-Meeting as well as the Interest Group discussion sessions. Despite the difference in availability of content and number of CME credits, virtual attendees will still fulfill their attendance requirement.

The Pre-Meeting, “Academic Career Development, Skills, and Success,” will take place on the afternoon of Tuesday, August 16, and will include a highly interactive workshop from 1:00 to 3:00 pm, followed by a panel and Q&A from 3:00 to 4:00 pm. Additionally, there have been some changes to the Interest Groups, due largely to the shift in dates of the meeting and prior conflicts by some Interest Group faculty. Thursday and Friday’s breakout sessions will now include Interest Groups facilitated by Plenary speakers Judge Steven Leifman, Petros Levounis, and Jessica Isom, which will offer a deeper dive into the topics on which they spoke. 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added sessions on “Spiritual Assessment and Intervention,” with Laura Dunn, and “Advances in Neuromodulation and Neuroimaging,” co-facilitated by Max Jiang and Andrew Fukada.

Soon after August’s meeting you will begin to see emails in your inbox announcing that registration has opened for the February 2023 meeting. Jeff Lyness is the Program Committee Chair, and he and the Committee have arranged an exciting lineup of speakers and topics. The theme of the meeting is “Lifelong Learning,” and the program will feature presentations on related topics, including competency-based education, diversity and inclusion, and the science of teamwork, as well as a debate on professionalism and a presentation by Jeff on the creative resilience of Ella Fitzgerald. I am also excited to report that Richard Kogan will be back to offer his expertise as both a psychiatrist and a world-renowned concert pianist as he performs—and comments upon—a selection of music by a classical composer (TBA). In the process, Richard will shine a light on the link between mental illness and creativity.

In other important news, after a lengthy process of demonstrating compliance with its accreditation requirements, the ACCME has once again reaccredited The College for another four years. More than just an audit ensuring that The College has dotted all the necessary i’s and crossed all the pertinent t’s, the reaccreditation process has always served as an opportunity for The College to reflect on, and better, its educational programming. Congratulations to CME Manager Nathan Zastrow and the CME Committee on an excellent job.

The Board of Regents met in February, and I can report good news from that meeting. The College ended 2021 with a surplus of \$311,000 (before investment gains). The 2021 year-end financial statement shows that The College had initially planned for a \$261,000 deficit for the year, reflecting a worst-case scenario in which a large cancellation fee would need to be paid to the Palm Springs Renaissance where the 2021 meeting was supposed to occur. Happily, the worst-case scenario did not materialize. Instead, the only consequence of the decision by the Board to cancel the 2021 meeting due to the pandemic was a forfeiture of the small deposit that had been paid to hold the space. Thanks to the work of Board of Directors and the Finance Committee in consultation with Mediquis Asset Advisors, The College has continued to operate in the black and the financial reserves remain strong.

The College has officially adopted a Diversity, Respectful Inclusion, and Equity Vision Statement. This was the culmination of a year-long development process by the Committee on Diversity, Respectful Inclusion, and Equity, including extensive input from the membership. My thanks to the Committee, including Chair Ike Ahmed and Vice Chair

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## From the Executive Director

A quick look in my files reveals that I signed the contract for this year's Annual Meeting at the Hyatt Regency Coconut Point Resort and Spa in April of 2018. Of course, the meeting was originally scheduled for February. Who would have guessed then that events would lead us to postpone the meeting until August. I'm happy to report, however, that despite the circumstances, registration for the August meeting is on track with previous years; to date 267 Members have registered for the meeting (167 to attend in person and 99 virtual attendees). We expect those numbers to increase as the meeting date nears. I'm also happy to report that the hotel has been very accommodating, allowing us to reschedule the meeting for August with no financial penalty.

And, it really is a great property for our Annual Meeting. For starters, the hotel is located just 14 miles (20 minutes) from Southwest Florida International Airport (RSW). [LB Transportation](#), located at the resort, provides transfers to and from the airport for approximately \$45. If you'd prefer to rent a car, the hotel offers discounted self-parking for \$5.00 per night and valet parking for \$27 per night.

The property offers many ways to stay cool in the Florida summer heat. It features four pools, five water slides, a lazy river, and a secluded private island. The hotel also offers a well-equipped fitness center, a full-service spa, fire pits, lawn games, and a nature boardwalk through the surrounding mangrove forest.

I know that this is a group that enjoys good food. And options abound. The hotel has four restaurants and bars. Grab breakfast or a coffee to-go at Cool Beans; enjoy fish tacos, salads, sandwiches, and frozen drinks poolside at Corkscrew; or have a leisurely breakfast or dinner at Tanglewood. Naples, which is about a 20-mile drive south, also offers many top-notch dining options. Incidentally, my goal when in the Naples area is to eat grouper as many times as possible. My recent visits did not disappoint on that front!

Of course, the real reason we're there is to participate in the excellent scientific program and reconnect with friends and colleagues. The Scientific Program Committee, chaired by Petros Levounis, has put together a great program for you (see pages 8-12). We'll also offer many opportunities for social engagement, including a welcome dinner Wednesday evening, and the traditional banquet on Saturday.

For those of you unable to attend the meeting in person, we'll provide an opportunity to interact with other College Members online prior to the meeting—a repeat of the extremely popular virtual networking tables offered during the 2021 Annual Meeting (stay tuned for more details).

# THE AMERICAN COLLEGE OF PSYCHIATRISTS SELECTS NEW BOARD MEMBERS, OFFICERS

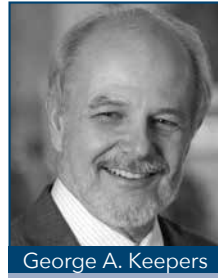
The American College of Psychiatrists has announced new Members of its Board of Regents and selected Board Officers. Members of the Board of Regents provide strategic leadership and oversight for the programs and future direction of The College.



**Larry R. Faulkner, M.D., FACPsych:**

Larry R. Faulkner was named President of The College. Dr. Faulkner is President and CEO of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology. From 1994 to 2006, Dr. Faulkner served as Vice President for Medical Affairs and Dean of the School of Medicine at the University of South

Carolina. Among other awards, Dr. Faulkner has received the Distinguished Service in Psychiatry Award from The American College of Psychiatrists, the Seymour Pollack Award for Distinguished Contributions to the Teaching and Education Functions of Forensic Psychiatry, and a Special Presidential Commendation for the Promotion of Psychiatric Education and Lifelong Learning from the American Psychiatric Association. Dr. Faulkner received his undergraduate education at Whitman College and attended the University of Washington School of Medicine. He completed his residency at the University of Arkansas and a fellowship at the National Institute of Mental Health.



**George A. Keepers, M.D., FACPsych:**

George A. Keepers was named First Vice President of The College. Dr. Keepers is Chair of the Psychiatry Department and Carruthers Professor of Psychiatry at Oregon Health & Sciences University in Portland. He also serves as Director of OHSU's Adult Attention Deficit Disorder Clinic. Dr. Keepers

earned a B.A. from the University of Missouri in Columbia, received his medical degree from Baylor College of Medicine and completed his residency at Oregon Health Sciences University.



**Marcy L. Verduin, M.D., FACPsych:**

Marcy L. Verduin was elected Second Vice President of The College. Dr. Verduin is the Associate Dean for Students and a tenured Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Central Florida College of Medicine. She serves as the Vice Chair of the AAMC's Group on Student Affairs (GSA), as the Vice

Chair for the ABPN's Addiction Psychiatry Article-Based Continuing Certification Committee, and as the Book Editor for the Journal of Psychiatric Practice. She is a Past President of the AAP, Past Chair of the AAMC's Southern GSA, and she served as a member of the ACGME Addiction Psychiatry Milestones 2.0 Work Group. Dr. Verduin graduated from the University of Florida College of Medicine and completed her residency training and addiction psychiatry fellowship at the Medical University of South Carolina.



**Eugene V. Beresin, M.D., FACPsych:**

Eugene V. Beresin assumed the role of President-Elect of The College. Dr. Beresin is Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School and Executive Director and Founder of the Clay Center for Young Healthy Minds at Massachusetts General Hospital. He is also Director of the Elizabeth Thatcher

Acampora Endowment, an outreach program to meet the mental health needs of underserved youth and families in three community settings. Dr. Beresin received his M.A. in philosophy and M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania. Subsequently, he completed an internship in pediatrics at Yale New Haven Hospital, his residency at Massachusetts General Hospital/Harvard Medical School, and a residency in child psychiatry at Boston Children's Hospital/Judge Baker Guidance Center/Harvard Medical School.





**Deborah J. Hales, M.D., FACPpsych:** Deborah Hales has joined The College's Board of Regents. Dr. Hales is the former Director of the Department of Graduate and Undergraduate Education and the Division of Education and Career Development at the American Psychiatric Association. Prior to that, she served as the Director of

the Residency Training Program at San Mateo County Health Services. Dr. Hales is a graduate of the University of California, Berkeley, and Case Western University School of Medicine. A frequent author and lecturer, Dr. Hales maintains a private psychiatric practice in Washington, D.C.



**Jay H. Shore, M.D., M.P.H., FACPpsych:** Jay Shore has joined The College's Board of Regents. Dr. Shore is the Director of the Office of Telehealth and Technology Implementation for Behavioral Health Practice and Science (TIPS) and a Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Family Medicine, School of Medicine and

Centers for American Indian and Alaska Native Health, Colorado School of Public Health at University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus. He is a population specialist at the Veterans Affairs Office of Rural Health's Veterans Rural Health Resource Center-Salt Lake City. Dr. Shore received a B.A. in Anthropology at Macalester College, followed by a Fulbright Fellowship in Australia. After earning his M.D. and M.P.H. at Tulane University School of Medicine and Public Health, he interned at the University of Buffalo and completed his adult psychiatry residency at the University of Colorado. Following residency, he embarked on a three-year external National Institutes of Mental Health Fellowship at the Centers for American Indian and Alaska Native Health.

**The Bowis Award** recognizes contributions to and leadership in The College. Past recipients include those who have served in the highest leadership positions of The College; those who have developed and disseminated the PRITE and PIPE exams; and those who have helped The College grow and prosper.

**The Distinguished Service in Psychiatry Award** recognizes significant achievements and leadership in the field of psychiatry. Eligibility is not limited to Members or Fellows of The College; anyone who has made a significant contribution to psychiatry may be nominated.

**Honorary Fellowship** is awarded to distinguished professionals, in the U.S. or abroad, who have made significant scientific and clinical contributions to the field of psychiatry but are otherwise ineligible for College membership. In addition to receiving a grant and a certificate, the Honorary Fellow delivers a featured lecture at the Annual Meeting. Note: Honorary Fellowship is awarded two years in advance, thus the June 30 deadline is for 2024 nominations.

**The Award for Creativity in Psychiatric Education** recognizes a teaching program that demonstrates innovation in psychiatric education.

# Laughlin and PRITE Fellowship Selection Committees Create Virtual Programming for Fellows

During the past two years, the Laughlin Fellowship Selection Committee and the PRITE Fellowship Selection Committee were given an exciting and unexpected challenge. In addition to selecting a wonderful group of Fellows, we strove to create a virtual environment where all The College Fellows could meet their mentors, connect with one another, learn about The College, and begin to grow as future leaders in the field of psychiatry.

To that end, the Committees gathered in the fall of 2020 and planned a series of virtual meetings for the Laughlin and PRITE Fellows. We celebrated the Laughlin and PRITE Fellows with virtual welcome ceremonies in 2020 and again in 2021.

Subsequently, College Fellows were invited to participate in small group workshops with faculty mentors and longer didactic workshops led by College faculty and invited speakers. Small group topics included: Work/Life Integration, Linear and Nonlinear Careers, Finding and Making Mentors and Job Negotiation. A special thanks to the many Committee and College Members who served as speakers and facilitators for these programs. Our longer sessions have included the following topics as part of our emerging leaders' curriculum: Authenticity and Play: Rediscovering Yourself, Visual Thinking Strategies, All Things Private Practice, Navigating Difficult Conversations, Negotiation 101 and Psychiatric Ethics: Capacity Consultations and DEI viewed through Graphic Medicine.

As we move forward, the Laughlin and PRITE Committees plan to work collaboratively to continue to develop a formal leadership curriculum for both groups of Fellows. Our hope is that a longitudinal curriculum will allow Fellows the opportunities to build skills, continue their connection to The College and ultimately support them in their roles as leaders in the field. ## *Eligible for Emeritus Status?*

If you are over 70 or fully retired, you are eligible for Emeritus status in The College. As an Emeritus Member or Emeritus Fellow, you are no longer obligated to attend one of every three Annual Meetings or pay Active Member dues of \$420 (although we do suggest making a voluntary dues contribution of \$75).

Although Emeritus Members and Fellows may vote on all matters coming before the membership and serve on committees, they are not eligible to hold elective office or serve as a committee chairperson.

## College Comments on Proposed Changes to ACGME's Common Program Requirements for Residents and Fellows

Recently, The College's Committee on Diversity, Respectful Inclusion, and Equity met to consider proposed changes to ACGME's Common Program Requirements (CPR) for Residents and Fellows. Specifically, the Committee discussed changes to Requirement #1.C. governing workforce recruitment and retention, as well as the proposed elimination of related annual evaluation requirements.

As a result of this discussion, the Committee recommended that The College's Board of Regents submit a comment to ACGME encouraging the organization to retain language in the CPR requiring programs to focus on the "recruitment and retention of a diverse and inclusive workforce of residents, fellows (if present), faculty members, senior administrative staff members, and other relevant members of its academic community." The Committee's rationale was that the proposed revision of striking out the list of positions after the word "workforce" left this term undefined when specificity is needed for diversity and inclusion. The Committee also asked the Board to request that ACGME leave in place language requiring an annual assessment of the program's efforts to recruit and retain a diverse workforce.

The Board approved the language recommended by the Committee and submitted its comments to ACGME. The Committee's recommendations are consistent with those of peer organizations such as APA, AADPRT and ADMSEP. To read the submitted comments in their entirety, click [here](#).
