From the President

It feels like The College is finally back on terra firma as we head into the new year and an entirely live Annual Meeting in February.

The Board of Regents continues to work hard to sustain and grow this great organization. At our most recent meeting in Chicago in October, we were pleased to welcome two new Board Members to our ranks. Deborah J. Hales, M.D., is the former Director of the Department of Graduate and Undergraduate Education and the Division of Education and Career Development at the American Psychiatric Association. Prior to that, she served as the Director of the Residency Training Program at San Mateo County Health Services. An author and frequent lecturer, Dr. Hales maintains a private psychiatric practice in Washington, D.C. Jay H. Shore, M.D., M.P.H., is the Director of the Office of Telehealth and Technology Implementation for Behavioral Health Practice and Science (TIPS) and a Professor in the Departments of Psychiatry and Family Medicine in the School of Medicine and in the Centers for American Indian and Alaska Native Health in the School of Public Health at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus. He is also a population specialist at the Veterans Affairs Rural Health Resource Center in Salt Lake City.

At its October meeting, the Board also decided to launch a year-long strategic planning process. The initiative will start in earnest in Tucson when a Task Force comprising the Board; representatives of the Committee on Diversity,

Respectful Inclusion, and Equity; senior Laughlin and PRITE Fellows; an early-career psychiatrist; and the Executive Director will meet to identify strategic issues for consideration. Subsequently, subcommittees will be appointed to discuss and make recommendations about strategies to address each strategic issue. The process will finish in October of 2023, when the Task Force determines specific key results and benchmarks for each strategy and the Board accepts and adopts a final strategic plan.

The Board of Regents also approved 20 new Members and seven new Fellows who will be inducted in Tucson. Twelve new Laughlin Fellows, two new PRITE Fellows, and two new CHILD PRITE Fellows will also attend the Annual Meeting. Fall is also PRITE and CHILD PRITE season at The College. Nearly 335 programs purchased PRITE in 2022, with 9,089 resident examinees. In addition,

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146 child programs administered CHILD PRITE to nearly 1,093 examinees. Nearly one-third of PRITE and CHILD PRITE programs opted to administer the exam electronically this year, a significant increase from last year.

After a year-long delay in the release of a new PIPE exam due to COVID, and a corresponding dip in the numbers of exams sold, sales have rebounded to monthly pre-COVID levels with the release of a new iteration of PIPE in July.

Turning now to our February Annual Meeting, Jeff Lyness and the members of the Committee on Scientific Programs have designed an outstanding program. The 2023 program reflects the theme of “Lifelong Learning,” and will feature plenary talks focused on the practical and ethical implications of advancing technology, inclusion, and teamwork. The breakout sessions will complement the plenaries by taking deeper dives into these topics. Breakouts will also include discussions focusing on the elimination of stigma pertaining to mental health substance use disorders; physician advocacy; post-COVID resident and faculty medical education; and mobile apps in clinical care. A complete program schedule can be found on pages 11-14 of this newsletter.

The College will present its annual awards on Saturday morning, featuring awards lectures focused on the treatment of schizophrenia, child and adolescent psychiatry, geriatric psychiatry, and mood disorders. We will also hear about our 2023 Honorary Fellow’s work on integrating psychiatry into primary care.

Finally, it was with sadness that we learned of the recent passing of Dwight L. Evans, who served as President of The College from 2009-2010. Dwight was a Past Chair of the Department of Psychiatry at the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. He will be missed by the many friends and colleagues whose lives he touched over his long and storied career.

From the Executive Director

Larry and Judy Faulkner and I, along with our meeting planner, Cherylyn Marks, conducted a final walk-through of the 2023 Annual Meeting hotel earlier this month. I'm happy to report that the JW Marriott Tucson Starr Pass Resort & Spa is even lovelier than I remember it from my initial site visit in 2018.

Nestled in the foothills of Tucson Mountain Park, the hotel offers beautiful views of the surrounding desert and guided hikes of the saguaro-dotted landscape every morning at 7:30. If sleeping in is more your style, wait for the day to warm up and then hit the multi-level pool, waterslide and lazy river.

There are also plenty of dining options on-site, including the Signature Grill, Passaggio Sonoran Trattoria, Salud Mexican Cuisine, Plunge Poolside Dining, and Catalina Barbecue. Those looking for off-site restaurants will be pleased to hear that Tucson was recently named a City of Gastronomy by UNESCO.

We'll provide a curated dining guide in January with information about some of the top area restaurants.

While we recommend making dining reservations in advance of the meeting, we will have a local concierge at our registration desk on Wednesday and Thursday to assist with tours and restaurant arrangements.

You could certainly spend the entire meeting on the hotel grounds without getting bored. If you choose to venture out to explore what greater Tucson has to offer, I have a few recommendations. The Desert Museum is a unique experience—part zoo, part botanical garden, part natural history museum and aquarium. It even boasts a spelunkable cave full of stalagmites and mineral deposits. The Tucson Museum of Art, located on the Historic Block, has an impressive collection of Meso-American pottery and contemporary art. The neighboring café is a lovely place for a lunch or weekend brunch. About 10 miles south of downtown Tucson, you'll find Mission San Xavier del Bac, a historic Spanish Catholic mission on the Tohono O'odham Nation San Xavier Indian Reservation. The mission was founded in 1692 by Padre Eusebio Kino. For information about other local attractions, click on <https://www.visittucson.org>.

Here is some other useful information about the hotel and locale to help you make the most of your time in Tucson:

- The College has negotiated a discounted room rate at the JW Marriott Starr Pass of \$299 per night (plus taxes). To book a room at the hotel visit <https://book.passkey.com/go/ACP2023> or call 888-527-8989.
- Those booking through The College block will also receive a discounted resort fee of \$5 per night (the normal rate is \$39). The fee covers:
 - Free self-parking
 - 15% off at the hotel's giftshop, spa shop, and marketplace
 - Daily fitness activities at the Hashani Spa
 - Free kid's dinner at the Signature Grill (12 and under)
 - High speed Internet access (wifi)
- The JW Marriott is just 12 miles from Tucson International Airport (TUS). Ubers are \$25-\$30 and cabs run \$40-\$50. The hotel recommends VIP taxi which offers a flat rate of \$40: <https://viptaxi.com/book-ride/#/booking/>

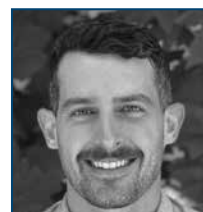

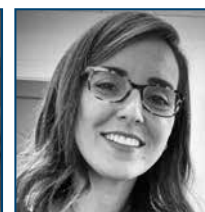

2023 PRITE® FELLOWS Named

The College has announced the selection of four psychiatry residents to serve as Fellows on its PRITE (Psychiatry Resident In-Training Examination®) Editorial Board.

Taken by nearly all psychiatry residents in the United States, PRITE serves as an educational resource for psychiatry residents and training programs. The exam allows individual residents to compare their knowledge base and clinical skills to their peers and offers residency training directors an insight into the performance of their residents, enabling them to make their programs more effective.

In order to include the views of psychiatry residents who sit for the exam, The College selects residents from residency programs throughout the United States and Canada to serve on the PRITE Editorial Board. In addition to being invited to two of The College's Annual Meetings, the PRITE Fellows are required to attend two PRITE Editorial Board meetings during their Fellowship.
